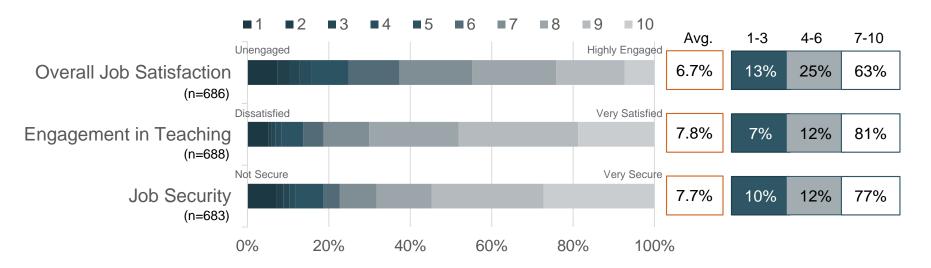

\*The Horace Mann Educator Advisory Panel has been in place since 2004 and consists of educators from across the country. Educators that sign up for the advisory panel are asked to complete 4 to 5 online surveys each year. Survey topics include a mix of educational-related topics and topics related to insurance and retirement. Currently, around 1,700 educators belong to the panel and are mostly Public K-12 teachers. Less than 15% of the panel members are Horace Mann customers.

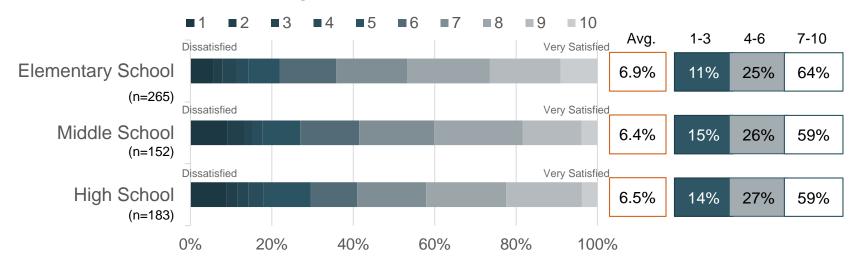


#### HMEAP – Job Satisfaction, Engagement, & Job Security

Of the three employee measures surveyed, job satisfaction is rated lowest with an average score of 6.7 on a 10 point scale. Overall job satisfaction is lowest for middle school teachers and highest for elementary school teachers.



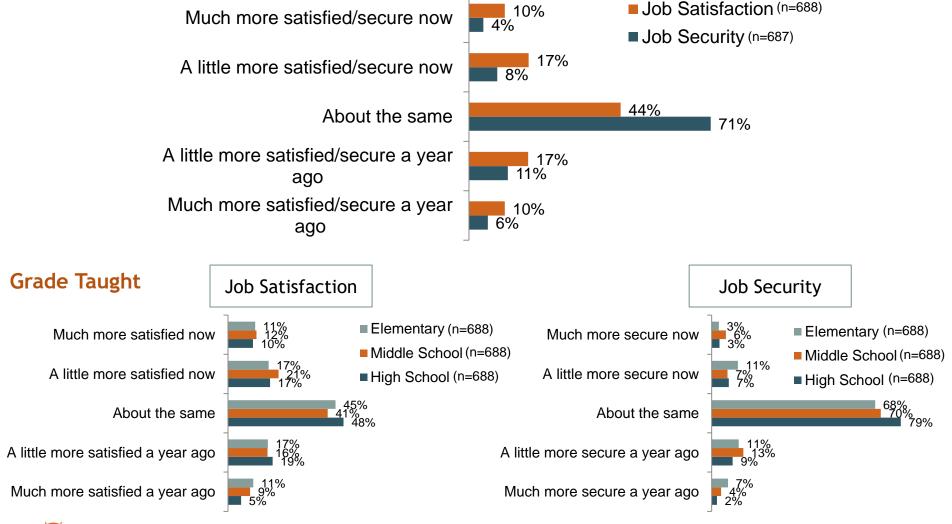
#### Overall Job Satisfaction - Grade Taught

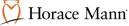


Q. Please rate yourself on the following dimensions: engagement in teaching, overall job satisfaction, and overall job security.

#### **HMEAP – Change in Job Satisfaction and Job Security**

Only 27% of teachers are more satisfied this year compared to last and 12% are more secure. While satisfaction is lowest among middle school teachers, it improved by the highest margin, 33% more satisfied this year vs. last.

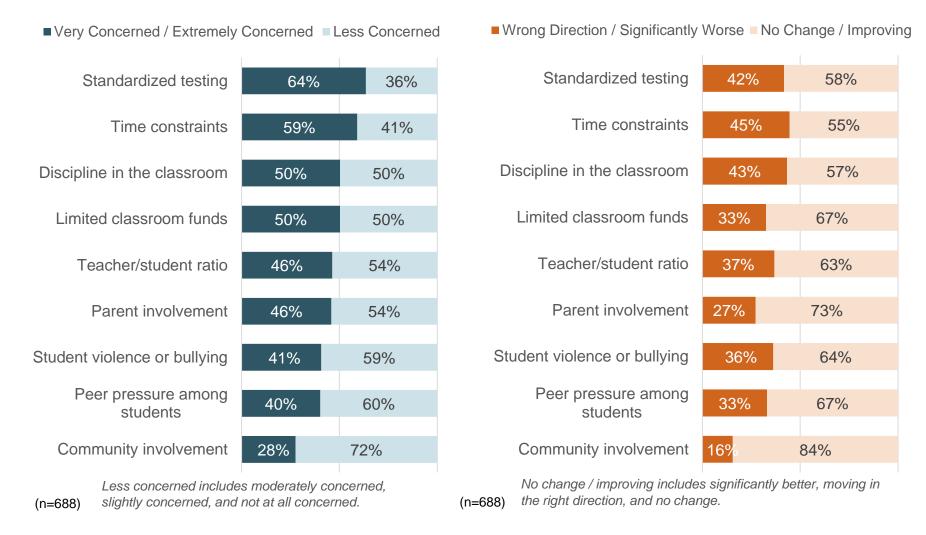




Q. How does your level of [job satisfaction] [job security] compare to a year ago?

#### **HMEAP – Classroom Concerns and Trends**

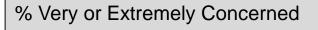
Standardized testing continues to be a major concern among teachers and 42% believe it's getting worse. Time constraints is also a major concern and is the problem cited most frequently as moving in the wrong direction.

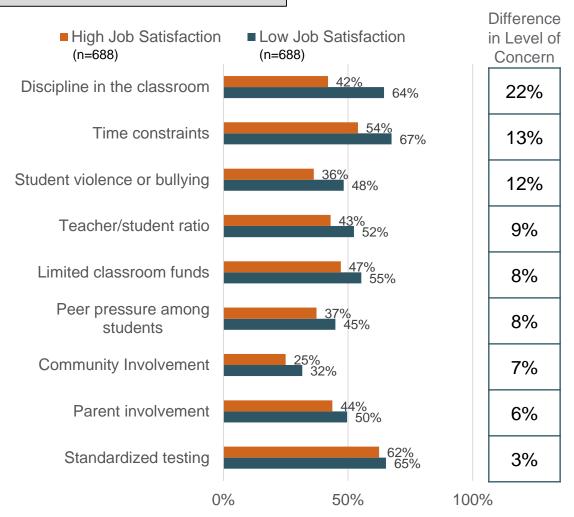


Q. How concerned are you about each of the following?

Q. Compared to a year ago, have things gotten better, stayed the same, or gotten worse?

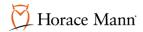
#### **HMEAP – Job Satisfaction and Classroom Concerns**





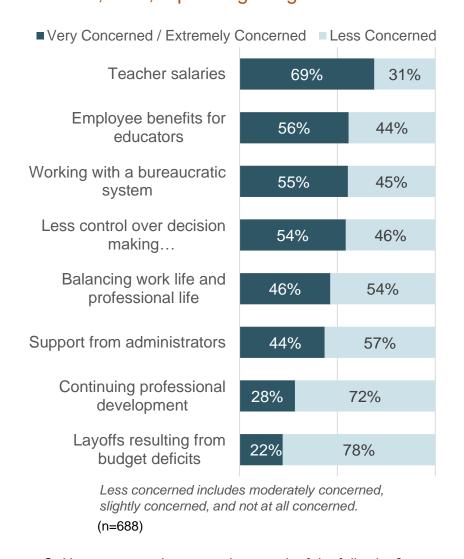
Educators with low job satisfaction are decidedly more concerned about student discipline than those with high job satisfaction. Additionally, time constraints, student violence and teacher/student ratios are also areas of particular concern to those with low satisfaction.

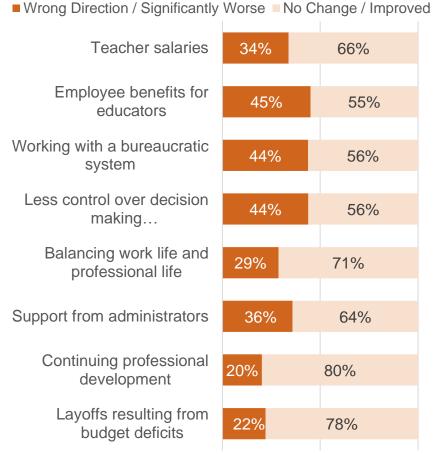
Job satisfaction was determined from "Please rate yourself on the following dimensions: engagement in teaching, overall job satisfaction, and job security". Responses of 7-10 were classified as high satisfaction and 1-6 were classified as low satisfaction.



## **HMEAP – Workplace Concerns and Trends**

69% of educators are concerned about teacher salaries but only 34% report that salaries have gotten worse in the past year. Employee benefits, on the other hand, is a concern that a large number of teachers, 45%, report is getting worse.





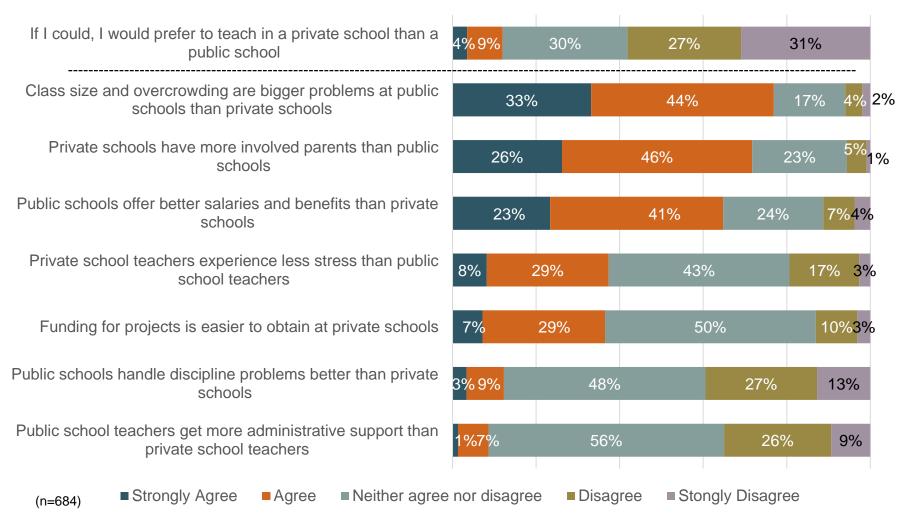
No change / improving includes significantly better, moving in the right direction, and no change. (n=688)

### HMEAP – Advantages of Private Schools vs. Public

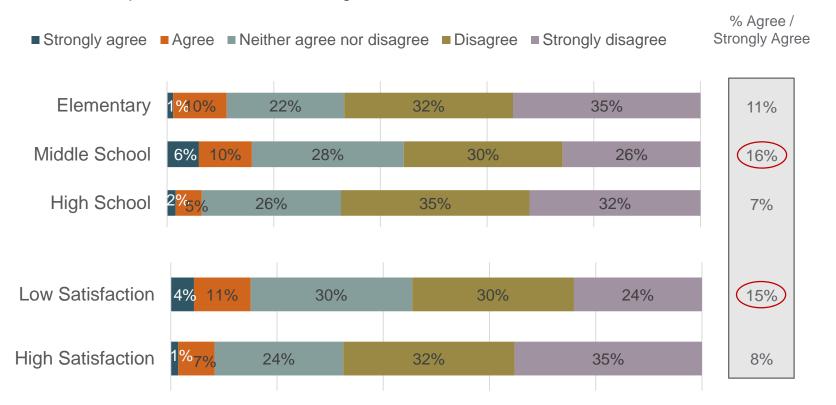
Smaller class size and parents that are more involved are possible advantages of teaching in a private school. Higher pay, however, is clearly a plus for public schools. All things considered, very few teachers would switch from public to private.

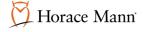


## **HMEAP – Teaching a Different Grade**

While in the minority, middle school teachers and teachers with low satisfaction are more likely to express a desire to teach a different grade level.

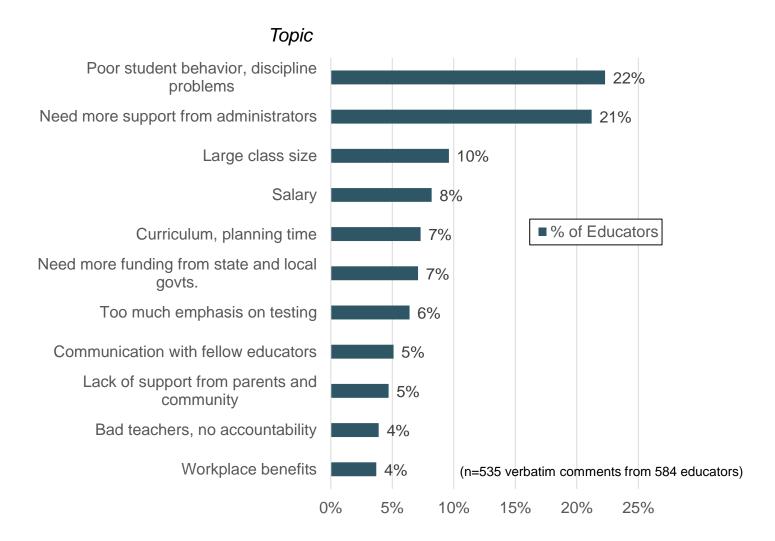
If I could, I would prefer to teach a different grade level than I do now.

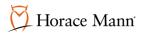




#### **HMEAP – Need for Change / Ideas for Improvement**

Educators reiterated their concern about student discipline when asked for the single greatest need for improvement at school. This is followed closely by a desire for more supportive administrators.

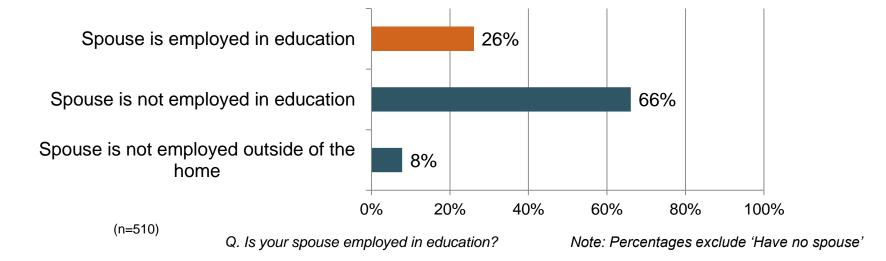


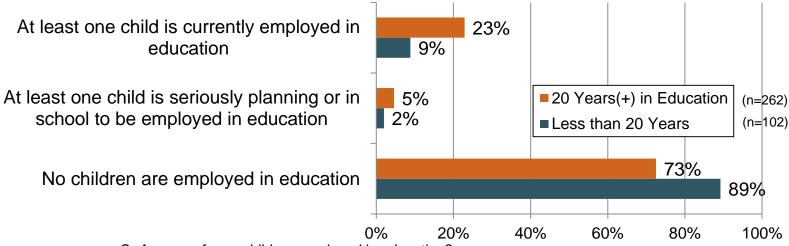


Q. What single issue, if any, do you believe is in greatest need of improvement at your school or district? What would you most like to see changed next year? [Open-ended]

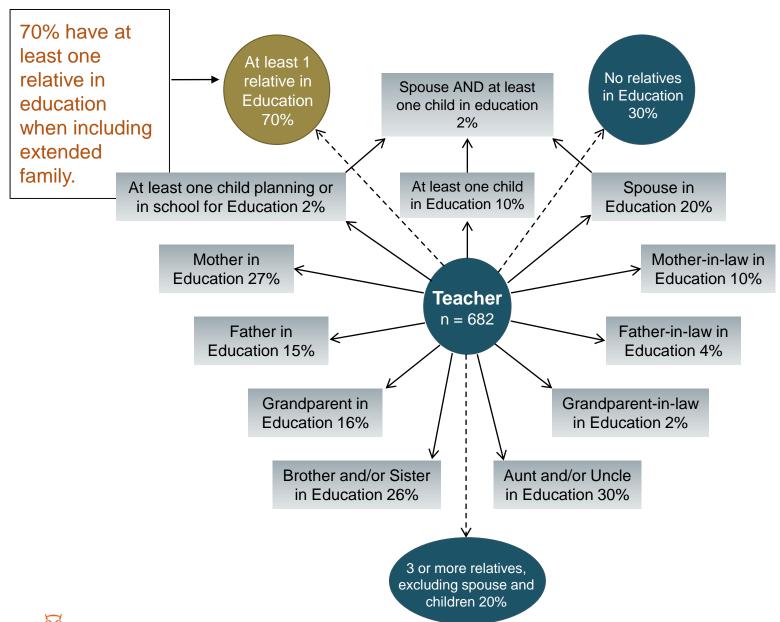

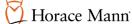
26% of educators are married to another educator and 23%, who have more than 20 years experience, have at least one child employed in education.
